Summer Term Curriculum in KS2:

Subsequently, as a team we compile in depth planning of these subjects which we use on a weekly basis to guide our teaching. Assessments:

June is a very important month for your child's formal assessments. Years 3 and 4 will be sitting their assessments from the week beginning **Monday 11^{th} June**. Your child's achievements will be recorded in their end of year report.

SWIMMING & PE:

The KS2 timetables for PE and swimming are as follows:

PE kit for the summer should be a **named** white T-shirt, navy shorts and trainers. Swimming kit comprises a swimsuit (one-piece costume for girls and above knee length shorts for boys - not long Bermuda-style), a towel and some suitable shoes for pool side or emergencies e.g. crocs, flip-flops.

Please observe the school rules for jewellery and ensure that, for safety reasons, only small stud earrings may be worn but must be removed for PE or swimming. Only permitted religious bangles may be worn and MUST be covered with a sweatband for PE and swimming.

Homework:

Our Brain Builder initiative continues in Years 3 and 4 and, although proving popular, we are concerned that the more creative approach is allowing for some children to 'relax' on the standards of the work being completed. Working independently on a piece of homework, away from the school environment, is an important part of education but expectations should remain very high. Please support us by finding your child the time and place to finish a task to the standards expected in school. If there is a genuine reason for any homework not being completed, please write a note to the class teacher, otherwise loss of Golden Time will continue until the completed work is handed in. In addition to the homework, children are expected to read for a minimum of 10-15 minutes Monday to Thursday and once over the weekend.

Handwriting

A joined, cursive style of handwriting is used throughout year 3 and 4 and indeed contributes to the child's overall English assessment. In order to reach the required standard in both year groups, children must consistently produce joined writing. Joined handwriting is taught in discrete lessons and your child should be encouraged to use it in any writing they undertake. Capital letters within words are unacceptable so please encourage your child to use lower case letters at all times, except of course when starting a sentence or using proper nouns.
