

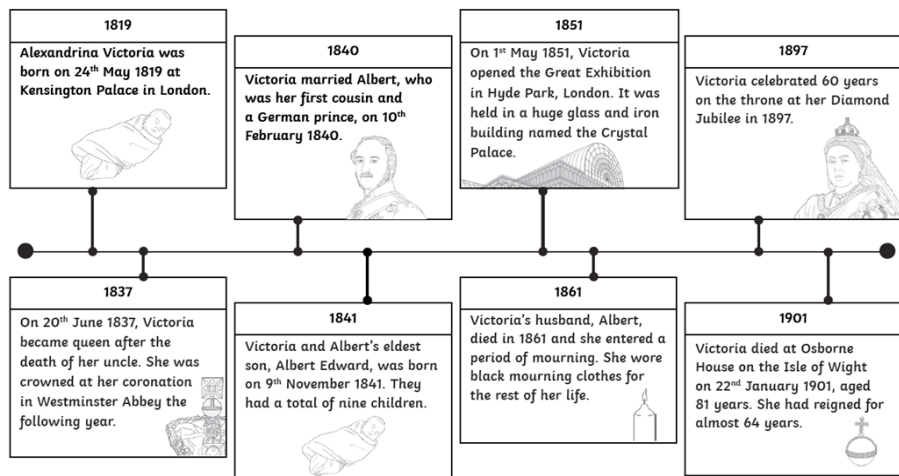
National Curriculum programme of study:

'Sticky' Knowledge

- Queen Victoria reigned between 1837 and 1901.
- Queen Victoria Reigned over Great Britain and Ireland.
- In the Victorian Era they used bathing machines to change in before entering the sea.
- They didn't use sun cream in the Victorian times.
- In the Victorian Era Men and Women swam separately in the sea.
- A Penny Lick refers to the small glass of icecream they have in Victorian times for one penny.
- In the Victorian Era people visited the seaside by Steam Train, and visited to walk the promenade rather than go on the beach.



Key Vocabulary

Bathing Machine	A wheeled carriage where people changed before entering the sea.
Penny Lick	A small glass cup used to serve a small amount of ice cream for one penny.
Promenade	A paved public walkway in front of the seafront.
Queen Victoria	Queen Victoria was the Queen of the Great Britain and Ireland in 1837 until her death.
Timeline	Visual representation of a sequence of events.
